HELP CARE SOCIETY TENTH ANNUAL REPORT OF HELP CARE SOCIETY

The Help Care Society was established in 1990 with the main objective of improving the quality of life of the under-priveleged Girl Child. Considering the fact that female infanticide was still prevalent in various parts of India, the endeavour of the Society has been to make the Girl Child self-reliant by providing her with an apportunity for basic education, remedial teaching where required, and subsequently giving her an apportunity for employment generation. The School Division, primarily concerned itself with sponsaring needy and mentarious children in schools in various parts of India. Not only was within fees provided but in various institutions uniform, stationery, after school coaching, medical and, mid-day medi was given to enable the students to have a better quality of life and education. It was not as if only girls were being given the localities. In various schools, economically very poor but mentarious boys were given freeships on the recommendation of the Principals of the schools. For this entire exercise, the Society is deeply indebted to Principals of large number of school of India which provided assistance.

At the Help Care Society, E-123, East of Kailash, New Delhi. Supportive Education classes were started and free tutions were provided to children living in slums but studying in Govt./Corporation Schools. Each day children studying at the Centre were Provided with midday snacks and assistance given in respect of stationery, text-books and school uniforms.

Supportive Education classes are also being started in hakpuri. Society has also agreed to give financial assistance to the Colony children who are being provided free tution by Mount St. try's School, Parade Road, Delhi Cantt. Delhi.



Medical assistance to the slum children coming to the Centre was taken care of by visits of doctors coming from AIIMS.

Eye care was given great emphasis this year. Private practioners visited the centre regularly for a period of time to examine the eyes of the children. After diagnosis, medicine was prescribed and a follow



Under nourishment/malnutrition has always been a malaise in the jhuggis. Although poverty could be one reason, the study conducted

by the Society revealed lack of knowledge among women regarding low cost nutritive diet also to be a strong factor resulting in the situation. In order to create awareness, the society organised low-cost nutrition of diet demonstrations at the jhuggis. At each demonstration, dishes were taught to the women which would be cheap but nutritive. In all 150 demonstrations were held.



At its centre in East of Kcilash the Help Care Society provided free training to women from jhuggi clusters in making of household condiments/pickles and stitching/tailoring. Trainers were appointed for this task and the products made by the trainees were later marketed by the Social Workers in Educational Institutions. The profits made thereof were then distributed amongst the workers. Over the year a arge number of women benefited from the training making an income if Rs. 400/- per month Such type of training centre was also maugurated in Sagarpur where a trainer from the backward community provided training to labour women. All costs were borne by the society.
